From the Desk of the President

Grievance Update:

The Grievance Committee processed three grievances since the opening of school. The Elementary Class Size Grievance settled without establishing a precedent. Elementary teachers who have a class size larger than 25 students will receive \$500 for each student above 25.

The NAFT was victorious on a class action grievance filed on behalf of paraprofessionals. According to the contract, paraprofessionals are to be notified at least a week in advance of their schedule for professional development days. This was not occurring. Superintendent Richard Smith found the Federation's case had merit and agreed that the District would notify paraprofessionals of their schedules at least a week in advance of professional development days.

The NAFT also filed a grievance on behalf of a cafeteria worker who was denied a full-time cafeteria position. The case is currently at the Superintendent's level of the grievance procedure.

Massachusetts Schools, Students Near Top in the World

According to newly released test scores, public school students in Massachusetts rank near the top in the world when it comes to math and science skills. More than 450,000 4th and 8th graders in 48 countries participated in the Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS). On the grade four science exam, for example, Massachusetts students came in second in the world, ahead of Taiwan, Hong Kong and Japan. AFT Massachusetts President Tom Gosnell said the results show that the state's investment in education is paying off. "We need to continue to make that investment so that we'll continue to have high quality teaching and high quality student achievement."
